We have not visited our old friend Daniel Storer lately so here are a few excerpts from 150 years ago the spring of 1862.


March 1st 2nd 1862. Snowed the most of the time. There is now over three feet of snow on the ground on the level.

March 10th to 12th. The rebels got up the old US ship of war "Merrimack" at Norfolk. Virginia where she was sunk by our forces last spring, and cased her with iron. They then came down to our blockading fleet near fortress Monroe and had a good navel battle, sinking two of our wooden vessels. Our iron clad "Monitor" came along just then and drove her back. Had she got out she would probably have cleared the entire southern coast of wooden vessels.

13th to 14th. Warm and pleasant. I rode down to Nathans the 14th, the first time since I was sick.

21st. Warm. Was down to Mr. Sherrard's to dinner today. Wilder and family were here visiting the eve. Had a good time fiddling.



25th to 27th. Cold. The water is higher now than it got last year. It has got up into Thomas A. Holmes dwelling house.



Rose Herzog

was born in 1927 at home in St. Joe, MN, Scott County which is about three miles east of Jordan, MN. At that time there was a Catholic Church located there and the District School where her father taught the upper four grades was next to the church. The district school was a two room school house. The home that the family lived in was also located close to the church and school. Rose's father was her teacher when she was in elementary school. All of the buildings in St. Joe's are gone now and all that remains is the St. Joe's Catholic Cemetery.

Rose was the second youngest of ten children. Her sister Agnes Searles and her brother Bill also are residents of Shakopee. Rose attended all of her eight grades in the district school in St. Joe's and then went on to High School in Jordan, MN. through her junior year. The family moved to Shakopee her senior year.

After graduation from High School, Rose was employed in the laboratory at Rahr Malting Company for nine years. After the nine years at Rahr, Rose decided to go on to school. She attended the three year nursing program at St. Mary's in Rochester, MN. She found employment after graduation from Nursing School at St. Mary's Hospital for several years and some time after that Rose and a friend decided to see more of the United States so they opted to go San Francisco, California. Thankfully before they left for San Francisco they were hired to work at the VA Hospital in San Francisco. Rose worked there for one and half years. After coming back to Minnesota she found employment at the VA Hospital in Minneapolis, MN where she worked until retirement. She made her home in Shakopee and commuted to work.

Her father, Bernard Herzog and mother Rose Hoeschen were both born in Stearns County, in the St. Rosa, MN Millwood Township area. They were married in Stearns County and in 1926 they came to St. Joe, MN where her father was the district school teacher. Her father went to school in Wisconsin for his teacher's certificate and also attended St. John's College for his music education. After teaching in District Schools for many years Mr. Herzog was elected the Superintendent of the County Schools in Scott County. He was also the music director for the Church of St. Mark in Shakopee for many years. Her mother, Rose, was a talented seamstress, sewing most of the children's clothing.

Rose's ancestry is German and Irish. Her paternal grandfather farmed in Stearns County and her maternal grandfather operated a store in Stearns County. Her Grandfather Herzog's family is from Germany and her mother's grandmother was from Ireland. Rose thinks that her great grandmother worked as a housekeeper for a Bishop but isn't sure of that information.

Rose and her family have close ties to the Shakopee area and have enriched our community. She has been a valued member of our society for many years and we thank her for her dedicated service.
